There are 3 areas of costs associated with your Scouting experience.

Annual Registration - National and Council fees. This covers BSA membership and insurance for 12 months.
The current fee is \$150.

Pack Activity Fee - Also called Pack dues. This money goes to the Pack and covers supplies for den and pack meetings, activities, events, and awards.

The fee for Pack for the 2026-27 scout year is \$

Additional Costs - Uniform, handbook, and some scouting events and activities you can opt to participate in, such as campouts.

Scouts are encouraged to "earn their way" by participating in annual fundraisers. Fall popcorn/nut sales and Spring Camp Card sales can help offset these costs and even earn a free week at summer camp.

One of the most important responsibilities of the Pack Committee is to keep the Pack operating with a first-rate, year-round program, achieved by following each of these 5 key steps.

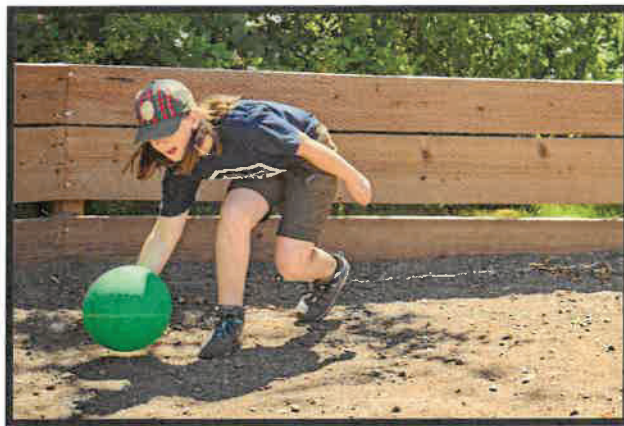
1. Recruiting Leadership

2. Planning

3. Budgeting

4. Communicating the Plan

5. Executing the Plan



#1: RECRUITING LEADERSHIP

Ensuring adequate volunteer support is critical – Scouting relies on dedicated volunteers to ensure a quality experience for all families on a weekly basis.

The worksheet on the next page should be completed annually by the Charter Rep, Cubmaster and Committee Chair when executing the ideal year of Scouting and updated following fall recruitment of new families or any change in adult leadership.

Every Pack must have a Cubmaster, Den Leader, Committee Chair and 2 additional Committee members; other positions listed are recommended. Planning or coordinating a short-term task or specific activity is a good leadership role for a new parent/volunteer.

Start by filling out who is currently serving in each role within your Pack. For any positions that are vacant, determine who the best/most qualified person in your Pack is and ask them directly to fill the position by providing specific information related to tasks and timeline. **Leverage existing families & their networks to fill Lion and Tiger Den Leader roles over the summer.** They may have an upcoming Lion themselves or have a neighbor, friend or colleague who would be interested in joining and serving as a leader. This approach is much easier than just asking “is there anyone here who is willing to fill this role?”



Once you have each role filled, the next step is to identify future leaders now to develop the **succession strategy** for each position. Some considerations:

- **Why plan?** Would you like help with your current role? If you left town tomorrow, who would ensure the Scouts aren’t disappointed?
- **When to engage?** Biggest opportunity is at new parent orientation. Adjust course whenever things change.
- **Who to target?** Any family that joins your unit is a possible successor! Give them a warm welcome, fully onboard them into your Pack and keep in touch with successor targets.
- **How do I execute the plan?** After identifying prospects, meet with them individually with a position description, invite them to fill the position, and ensure they’re provided with training, support, guidance and mentorship along the way.

Trained leaders/volunteers directly impact the quality of programs on a weekly basis – and as a result, the longevity of families in Scouting. It is strongly recommended for all volunteers to complete position-specific training, available any time at <https://my.scouting.org>. Additional in-person and supplemental training is also made available through the Council; details on upcoming training events can be found in step 2.

#2: PLANNING

The more, the merrier. Encourage as many leaders and parents from your Pack to attend program launch, scheduled for the May Roundtable at 7:00pm; here, you will receive a calendar of local district and council activities planned for the upcoming school year. From there, schedule your Pack's annual planning session to brainstorm fun and creative activities for your dens and Pack! We recommend gathering as many Scouts and parents as possible so that their voices are heard and they have input into the process. ***It is helpful to start with a blank master calendar that includes major local events, holidays, school schedule, etc.***

"Involve your unit in the construction of a program plan that excites them"

Start by reviewing last year's program. Which activities worked and which did not? Decide what activities and special meetings you would like to do again. Also determine whether or not your budget was adequate (save these notes for step 3).

Brainstorm – no ideas are off limits! Write all of them down. When you run out of ideas, then add the council/district activities and events listed below (this is the same list provided to you at program launch. The most complete, updated and accurate list of North Florida Council events can be found at www.nfcscouting.org/calendar).



Prioritize your list and place the top activities and events into your calendar by month.

Add recurring events – such as weekly den meetings, monthly pack meetings and quarterly committee meetings (*at minimum*) to your calendar.

Boring or unorganized meetings are the #1 reason families leave Scouting!

- Plan Your Meetings in Advance, with focus on the flow of activities.
- Make it interactive and fun – skits, songs, cheers and hands-on activities during the meeting – and snacks after - will win your families over.
- Use immediate recognition and congratulate enthusiastically for completing a benchmark on the advancement trail.
- Establish the rules that each meeting will follow – including limiting announcements to 5-8 minutes at the end of your meeting.

#3: BUDGETING

Now that you know what you want to do and when you are going to do it, let's figure out what it is going to cost. Use the budget worksheet on the next page as a guide to develop your annual program costs, fundraising goals, and activity fee (*if any*). Any cells highlighted in yellow should be customized to your unit/event/activity. Be sure to include costs for food, transportation (gas), and other "incidental" costs associated with activities.

Packs should plan to take advantage of the Council's 2 annual product sales. Unit and family participation allows the unit access to free use of camp properties throughout the year. Scouts will earn their own way through the program all while learning salesmanship & communication skills in a safe environment. ***Units who wish to take part in any non-Council fundraisers MUST complete & submit the BSA Money Earning Application to their local Executive.***

Camp Card: Takes place from February-April. This is a risk-free sale where Scouts earn 50% Commission and the opportunity to earn a FREE week of camp! Participating units in the North Florida Council raised over \$1,000 directly back to their unit in 2025.

Popcorn: Takes place from August-December. Units earn 30+% Commission & can utilize a storefront reservation system to book selling opportunities. An easy-to-use app tracks sales and takes payments. Participating units in the North Florida Council raised over \$1,300 directly back to their unit in 2025.

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FISCAL POLICIES AND PROCEDURES FOR BSA UNITS***Frequently Asked Questions*****Should our unit have a checking account?**

Yes, unit funds should be deposited in a checking account that requires two signatures.

Does a unit need its own tax identification number? If so, where do we get it?

The answer depends how the unit is chartered. Most charter registered units obtain their own tax ID number by completing IRS Form SS-4, which now requires the designation of a responsible party. (www.irs.gov) Contact your chartered organization for permission and direction on who to use as the responsible party. For most Scouting units, the Committee Chair is an appropriate responsible party. For council registered units, contact your council for instructions.

Who is responsible for the finances of the unit?

The unit committee is responsible, but the assets belong to either the chartered organization or to the council depending on how the unit is chartered.

Should our unit consider insuring our unit equipment?

Yes, the chartered organization or the council owns the assets.

Can our unit deposit funds with the local council?

Yes, most councils allow units to deposit funds to their credit in the council service center.

What happens to the unit funds and equipment should the unit dissolve?

The unit committee shall apply unit funds and property to the payment of unit obligations and shall turn over the surplus, if any, to the chartered organization or to the council.

When should our unit submit a BSA Unit Money-Earning Application?

For all unit fund raising. Approval must be given by the chartered organization and the council.

Is our unit considered tax-exempt by the IRS?

Chartered organizations vary widely, but the tax status of your unit is usually the same as that of your chartered organization if the chartered organization includes the unit in its tax-status. For council registered units, contact your council for more information.

Can our unit be covered under the BSA's group exemption?

No. The IRS only allows local councils (and council trust funds) to be included under the BSA.

Can our unit be exempt from state sales taxes?

Check with your own state as this varies widely across the country.

A volunteer suggested that our unit apply for its own tax-exempt status. Can we?

No, units should not incorporate or apply for their own tax-exempt status. Units are not legal entities.

We can't solicit gifts for our unit?

No, units are not permitted to solicit any gifts.

Does that mean people can't make gifts to our unit?

Anyone can contribute, but the donor would not receive a charitable deduction.

Can my unit credit amounts from fundraising to an individual toward their expenses?

Expenses must be reasonable and related to Scouting for youth to "earn their own way."

GUIDELINES FOR UNIT MONEY-EARNING PROJECTS

A unit's money-earning methods should reflect Scouting's basic values. Whenever your unit is planning a money-earning project, this checklist can serve as your guide. If your answer is "Yes" to all the questions that follow, it is likely the project conforms to Scouting's standards and will be approved.

1. Do you really need a fundraising project?

There should be a real need for raising money based on your unit's program. Units should not engage in money-earning projects merely because someone has offered an attractive plan. Remember that individual youth members are expected to earn their own way. The need should be beyond normal budget items covered by dues.

2. If any contracts are to be signed, will they be signed by an individual, without reference to the Boy Scouts of America and without binding the local council, the Boy Scouts of America, or the chartered organization?

Before any person in your unit signs a contract, he/she must make sure the venture is legitimate and worthy. *If a contract is signed, he/she is personally responsible.* He/she may not sign on behalf of the local council or the Boy Scouts of America, nor may he/she bind the chartered organization without its written authorization. If you are not sure, check with your district executive for help.

3. Will your fundraiser prevent promoters from trading on the name and goodwill of the Boy Scouts of America?

Because of Scouting's good reputation, customers rarely question the quality or price of a product. The nationwide network of Scouting units must not become a beehive of commercial interest.

4. Will the fundraising activity uphold the good name of the BSA? Does it avoid games of chance, gambling, etc.?

Selling raffle tickets or other games of chance is a direct violation of the BSA Rules and Regulations, which forbid gambling. The product must not detract from the ideals and principles of the BSA.

5. If a commercial product is to be sold, will it be sold on its own merits and without reference to the needs of Scouting?

All commercial products must sell on their own merits, not the benefit received by the Boy Scouts. The principle of value received is critical in choosing what to sell.

6. If a commercial product is to be sold, will the fundraising activity comply with BSA policy on wearing the uniform?

The official uniform is intended to be worn primarily for use in connection with Scouting activities. However, council executive boards may approve use of the uniform for any fundraising activity. Typically, council popcorn sales or Scout show ticket sales are approved uniform fundraisers.

7. Will the fundraising project avoid soliciting money or gifts?

The BSA Rules and Regulations state, "Youth members shall not be permitted to serve as solicitors of money for their chartered organizations, for the local council, or in support of other organizations. Adult and youth members shall not be permitted to serve as solicitors of money in support of personal or unit participation in local, national, or international events."

For example: Boy Scouts/Cub Scouts and leaders should not identify themselves as Boy Scouts/Cub Scouts or as a troop/pack participate in The Salvation Army's Christmas Bell Ringing program. This would be raising money for another organization. **At no time are units permitted to solicit contributions for unit programs.**

8. Does the fundraising activity avoid competition with other units, your chartered organization, your local council, and the United Way?

Check with your chartered organization representative and your district executive to make certain that your chartered organization and the council agree on the dates and type of fundraiser.

The local council is responsible for upholding the Charter and Bylaws and the Rules and Regulations of the BSA. To ensure compliance, all unit fundraisers MUST OBTAIN WRITTEN APPROVAL from the local council NO LESS THAN 14 DAYS before committing to the fundraising activity.



#4: COMMUNICATING THE PLAN

Once you have completed your Pack's final program plan, consisting of an activity/event/meeting calendar and supporting budget, it should be made available at the beginning of the Pack's program year (end-July/early August) to all families. This shows a level of **organization** and **transparency** from the unit's leadership.

Poor communication is the #2 reason families leave Scouting!

Sharing your finished product with members of the Pack requires different approaches based on your audience.



Scouts need excitement – “Scouts, here’s what we have planned for the year: Pinewood Derby, overnighter on the Yorktown, sleepovers at the Jumbo Shrimp game and Seaworld and a family fun weekend where you’ll shoot bb guns and bows and arrows and roast marshmallows over a campfire! You can do all these fun things by selling \$x worth of camp cards and popcorn!”

Parents need simplicity – especially those parents who weren’t involved in the planning process. “Parents, here’s what we have planned for the year – Pinewood

Derby, overnighter on the Yorktown, sleepovers at the Jumbo Shrimp game and Seaworld and a family fun weekend. Your Scout can participate fully with no cost to you if they sell \$x worth of camp cards and popcorn.”

At this juncture, you can present an organized, safe and succinct fundraiser (camp cards and popcorn) and establish individual goals that will fund each Scout’s Ideal Year of Scouting. Paying for the fun will be much easier and participants will be more successful when they know what the money is going towards. **The unit will spend more time Scouting and less time fundraising.**

Properly communicated, the plan will excite both Scouts and parents to success!

You’ll also want to send a copy of your Pack’s finalized program plan to your local Scouting professional as well as your volunteer Commissioner. Keeping them updated with your plans is important, as both serve as resources to your unit’s leadership.

It is also important that you share your program plan with new families at your Pack’s parent orientation following your sign up night so they can be fully onboarded into your Pack and begin assisting with activities and events.



#5: EXECUTING THE PLAN

Utilize your standing committee meetings (held quarterly, at minimum) to review previous activities and programming while fresh and make final plans and preparations for upcoming activities and events.

Promote early sign ups for District & Council activities. Spots are not guaranteed. Events have maximum capacities and registration deadlines to ensure a dynamic experience for all registered participants.
